




- Myanmar is 676,577 sq km.

- 7 States: Chin, Kachin, Kayin, Kayah, Mon, Rakhine and Shan.




Market Size

Myanmar & ASEAN Growth











Electricity Supply by Source and Demand Growth








Tourism Growth




FDI Foreign Direct Investment

- All time high of 2443.39 USD million in August 2014
- Most Foreign Direct Investment has been funded by China, Singapore, Thailand and Hong Kong.
- The Foreign Investment Law (2012), allows for 100% foreign ownership or joint venture for FDI.













Corruption Perception Index


Ranked 147th least corrupt out of 168 countries and territories.

Ease of Doing Business

Special Economic Zones

 Central Body for Myanmar Special Economic Zone has been solely responsible for FDI oversight.

• SEZ's = increase of Foreign investments.

• As of 2015, there are three SEZ's in Myanmar



KYAUKPHYU SEZ

- Developed by China & Myanmar
- Deep sea port, industrial and estate area zones, strategically located between China and India
- International firms being reviewed for developing this 75 sq.km zone; expected to be announced by end of 2015
- Implementation scheduled in three phases, expected to finish by 2016, 2020 and 2025
- Expected to rival Singapore as a Petrochemical Hub with a USD 2.5 bn oil and gas pipeline supplying to China

THILAWA SEZ

- Developed by Japan and Myanmar private and public sectors
- Deep sea port, industries mainly manufacturing, construction materials and garment over 24 sq km with 3-phases
- Timelines: 1st Phase operational in Aug-2015; 2nd phase - end of 2016; 3rd phase end 2018
- Japan is the main investor while firms from Korea, Thailand, Hong Kong and the US have also invested

DAWEI SEZ

- Developed by Thailand and Myanmar with support from Japan
- Deep sea port, multiple industrial zones and shippard covering a total of 196 sq.km with the future largest industrial zone in SEA
- Suspended in 2013 due to financial hurdles faced by developer, Italian-Thai
 Co. To be re-iniated with a USD 1.7 bn deal for the first phase in August 2015
- Japan, South Korea, Thailand and China are potential investors

Special Economic Zones

Industrial Zones

PROS

- It has been long established since 1990s and hence the procedures of doing businesses are already in place compared to SEZ – which is a new concept
- More generous incentives and longer
 lease

SEZ

- More stable and better power supply and infrastructure
- The lease rate is more competitive (USD 75 per square feet for 50 years) than in industrial zones where the price swings subject to speculation

CONS

- The electricity and power supply are not unified among different industrial zones
- Limited infrastructure

- Carries risk due to the fact that it is new concept which has not been tested
- · As management is decentralized,
- there is risk of dependency on one single entity



Market Entry

 Privatization of previously state owned institutions → opportunity



- Specific areas: telecom, banks, public infrastructure, shipping and transport, oil and gas, natural resources, industrials, energy and healthcare.
- 2/3 of credit has been provided to trade, manufacturing, construction and agriculture

Market Entry Continued

- Depending on the industry, current economic and political regulations, the mode of entry (joint venture, exporting, licensing etc) may be different.¹³
- Consulting services are available in Myanmar to ease this process. (Mita)
- Country specific resources may also help to enter market (JETRO Business Center)



Market Entry Costs

Basic policies of opening a business in Myanmar

Conduct a name check at the Company Registration Office (CRO) at the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA)	Kyat 1,000 (form fee)
* Obtain reference letter from the ward chief	no charge
Obtain criminal history from the township police station	no charge
Request business incorporation certificate	Kyat 5,100 (application fee)
Obtain signature of the directors before a lawyer or certified public accountant	Kyat 40,000 for witnessing the signature of the memorandum and articles of association
Payment of stamp duty and registration fees	Kyat 1 million (registration fees) + Kyat 60,000 (stamp duty)
Open Bank Account	no charge
Obtain certificate of incorporation	paid as part of company incorporation fees
Submit certification of registration documents (CRD)	no charge
Obtain a seal or a rubber stamp	Kyat 2,000
Register for commercial tax	no charge



Stumbling Blocks & Chances

 Business people in Mandalay & Yangon speak English, (not commonly spoken outside of major cities) Chinese is spoken in Mandalay, Yangon, and major trade zones near the China-Myanmar border. Thai is widely spoken in major trade zones near the Thai-Myanmar border.


- Infrastructure is key hurdle to overcome in long term success.



- The legal situation, as with many aspects of Myanmar, is rapidly changing. Outdated laws are being updated, and the new parliamentary body is moving forward with the goal of implementing a coherent legal structure. Several Investment laws to be aware of moving forward are:¹⁴


